G. All entries will have a cost per wear form with the item. Forms at the Extension Office. H. CLOTHING CONSTRUCTION

A. Exhibitors may enter more than one exhibit per class.

B. All exhibits must be products of the current club year.

C. ALL CLOTHING MUST HAVE A LABEL TACKED INVISIBLY TO THE NECK FACING OF THE DRESS OR THE CENTER BACK OF THE BELT OR SKIRT. Labels available at the Extension Office.

D. Pre-cut knits are acceptable for all classes.

E. Garments should be carefully laundered or cleaned before exhibiting.

F. Each garment should be placed on a hanger. Attach skirts to hanger with large safety pins.

G. If made of delicate fabric, the garment must be protected by placing it in a clear plastic bag.

H. An individual receiving State Fair blue on clothing garments at the county fair may make only 1 entry in the 4-H Clothing Division at the State Fair.

I. Clothing Construction will be judged by consultation at the fair on Friday morning.

J. A champion and reserve champion will be selected from each class. A grand champion and reserve grand

champion overall will be selected from the class champions.

K. Recycled Clothing - An item made of at least 50% recycled material (recycled means reusing an existing item in a new way). Could be remaking/redesigning a garment, re-purposing a clothing item for a new use, etc. Must include sewing of some kind. A 3"x5" index card MUST accompany entry describing the recycled materials and how they were used in the item.

B. A member may enter more than one exhibit in each class.

C. When articles which are normally worn as a pair are exhibited, both articles must be shown together. Fasten articles together securely with yarn.

D. Special consideration will be given to articles which are of original design. Such articles should have a note attached explaining the original design.

E. Exhibitors are expected to be enrolled in the Fiber Art project in which they are entered. When the exhibit is a sewed garment that also includes one or more Fiber Art techniques (i.e. knitting, crochet, needle arts, or patchwork and quilting), the determination of what division (Clothing or Fiber Arts) and class in which to enter will be left with the 4-H participant

F. All exhibits which need to be hung MUST have the appropriate hanger, rod, wire or other mechanism attached in order to be properly displayed.

G. There are no age-specific classes in fiber arts. The Exhibitor's age and years in the project will be considered by judges.

ENTOMOLOGY

A. All entries should be submitted in an 18x24x3.5 inch wooded box with a clear plastic top. No glass allowed.
B. Identification should follow the taxonomy as printed on the "Insects in Kansas Book: 2016 Revised Taxonomy" which follows www.bugguide.net

C. Each exhibitor is required to identify each box with two ID labels bearing exhibitor's name, county, the class, and statement of taxonomy used: <u>Insects in Kansas</u> or <u>Insects in Kansas Book: 2016</u>. One lable is on the inside of the box in the upper left corner and on the outside of the box in the lower right corner. Arrange specimens in the box so it can be displayed lengthwise.

D. The number of orders, specimens (and families where required) must be included on the exhibitor's box ID label. Only adult specimens can be used; however, one female and one male of a species correctly identified can be displayed.

E. Arrange specimens in groups or rows parallel to the short sides of the box. Arrange by order then family where required.

F. Two labels will be centered on the pin beneath each specimen. First is the common name and the second should include date/locality, full county name, state abbreviation and collector name.

G. Purchased insects are not to be exhibited in collections, but they may be used in educational displays.H. More detailed rules of each class are at the Extension Office and will be provided at request.

I. Entomology Collection Notebooks will follow Kansas State Fair rules which are available upon request. **CLASSES:**

- 280. Beginning Entomology I Collection--Display in one standard box a minimum of 50 and a maximum of 125 species representing at least 7 orders.

A. Exhibit box should be 18x24x3.5 inches with a plexiglass top, no glass allowed. Specimens should be arranged across narrow width of box.

Jr. Superintendent: Dale Hoch (take pictures) A. Perishable Foods judging will be held Friday, July 22, 2016, 2:00 P.M., at the Community Bible Fellowship Church, 2853 NE Curry Lane, Medicine Lodge.

B. This event will be judged and awards presented as other fair entries. There will be champion and reserve champion in each class.

C. Hot foods must be presented to the judge at 140 degrees or above and cold foods must be presented at 40 degrees or below. For food safety purposes items that do not meet temperature requirements will not be judged.

D. Members can also compete in a place setting contest. Only one place setting is needed for this contest. A menu for a meal of choice should be provided on a $4" \times 6"$ note card. Each exhibitor must supply their own card table.

E. Each perishable food item must have a poster made up for the fair. Photos will be provided by the Extension office from the judging day.

F. If members take 2 perishable food items they will have 2 separate posters.

G. The size should be 14" x 22" which is half of a regular posterboard. It should include a picture of the item, recipe, and a brief story about the item.

H. Table settings will be brought to the fair and put in the glass showcase. You do not need to bring the card table.

I. Posters will be displayed with the foods exhibits, they will not be judged. However, posters must fill requirements in order for members to receive premium money for perishable foods.

A. See General Rules.

B. There is no limit to the number of entries per class.

C. All baked products must be placed on white or tin foil covered cardboard cut to fit the size of the product, except pies and coffee cakes **which must be in a DISPOSABLE CONTAINER** and enclosed in a plastic bag.

D. All unfrosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with top crust showing. Except those with special designs, such as a bundt cake. Frosted cakes will be exhibited with **SHORTENING BASED ICING ONLY**.

For food safety purposes, any food w/ custard and cream cheese type fillings and frostings, flavored oils, "canned" bread or bread or cakes in a jar or food requiring refrigeration will not be judged.

E. Each member needs to exhibit <u>three (3)</u> of the following: cookies, bars, muffins. A loaf of bread or cake or pie or coffee cake will be exhibited uncut. Cookies and rolls must be the same size and shape and be from the same recipe.

F. NO COMMERCIAL MIXES ACCEPTED ABOVE

LEVEL I. Recipes in the food project books are only guidelines.

G. RECIPES MUST ACCOMPANY THE EXHIBIT.

H. Educational exhibits may be in the form of a poster, notebook, or display. A poster may be no larger than 22" x 28". If the exhibit is a display the maximum size is 3'x 4' tri-fold display board. Exhibit should describe something learned, a project activity done, a food nutrition community service program, etc.

I. Exhibits not meeting the above guidelines will be dropped one ribbon placing.

J. A champion and reserve champion will be selected from each level. There will be one grand champion and one reserve grand champion overall foods. These foods will have the option of being sold at the Premium Sale. 4-H members or a parent must sign a sale ticket in the fair office by Saturday at 8:00 p.m. in order to participate. No phone-ins will be accepted.

K. Other foods will be sold at the food sale. The food sale will take place on Friday. Money earned will make improvements in the 4-H Building, starting with the Foods and Nutrition exhibit.

L. Conference judging will begin at 9:00 am on the first day of the fair. A sheet will be available at check in to sign up for the conference judging. If a 4-Her is not present when their name is called, the name will be moved to the bottom of the list. If 4-Hers are not present before the end of consultation judging their items will be judged without consultation.

M. Decorated Cakes, Gift Packages & theme class will be eligible for Level Champion based on age of exhibitor. **CLASSES:**

*333. Any food using Pineapple not requiring refrigeration - open to all ages.

- 334. Level I Foods Ages 7-9. Box mixes may be used. Non-perishable food product, may include snack mixes, cookies, muffins, cup cakes, etc.
- 355. Educational exhibit.
- 336. Level II Foods Ages 10, 11. Non-perishable food product, may include nutritious snack, baked cookies (bar or drop), quick breads, muffins, coffee cake (made without yeast), fruit leather, one layer cake, any flavor, frosted, etc.
- 337. Educational exhibit.
- 338. Level III Foods Ages 12, 13, 14. Non-perishable foods product, may include cookies (rolled or pressed), yeast breads or rolls, quick breads, muffins

and sweet dough pastries, cakes (foam or sponge), 2-layer cake, any flavor, frosted, or decorated, etc.

- 339. Educational Exhibit.
- 340. Level IV Foods Ages 15 and older. Non-perishable food product, may include cake (foam or sponge) 2- layer cake, any flavor, frosted, or decorated, specialty yeast breads, tea ring, cinnamon rolls, fruit pie, etc.
- 341. Educational exhibit
- 342. Decorated Cake a cake form may be used. If a real cake is used, it will also be judge on quality. This class is not eligible for the Kansas State Fair.
- 343. A Food Gift Package and/or Specialty Food Product.
 No alcoholic beverages will be accepted. A food gift package must contain at least three different food items, prepared by the 4-Her, in a suitable container no larger than 18"x18"x18". Prepared food items must have recipes attached with entry. Additional homemade food items beyond the 3 minimum or purchased items also may be included in the gift basket. On the back of the entry card, answer these questions: a)What is the intended use? b)What food safety precautions were taken during and after preparations? This entry will count as a non-perishable food product.

FOOD PRESERVATION

A. Read General Rules.

B. Exhibits must have been preserved since the previous fair.

C. Exhibits must be sealed in clean standard jars, halfpint, pint, etc., with two-piece lids.

D. Each jar exhibited must be labeled with uniform **label** placed one inch from the base of jar. Label must not cover brand name of jar. Labels are available at Extension Office.

E. Label must contain name of product, date preserved, the canning method (water bath, weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), process time, and amount of pressure (psi) when pressure canning method is used. Examples available from Extension Office.

F. All containers of pickles, jelly, and other sweet spreads may be opened and examined for quality by judge. Jars must be sealed when entered.

G. There will not be a limit on entries.

H. All Food Preservation classes are eligible for the State Fair.

I. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with the entry card. Recipes must be from 1995-present. Processing methods that will be disqualified include: open kettle canning, over canning, and sun canning. Homemade recipes or other untested recipes will be disqualified for safety reasons. Tested recipes sources available from the Extension Office. CLASSES:

J. A Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion will be chosen from the enlargements only.

- A. Read General Rules.
- B. Label each article, with name of article and class.

C. Articles may have been used, but if so, should be cleaned before exhibited, and should be made during the current year.

D. If battery power is required, youth shall provide battery. Operating instructions should be provided.

E. Full rules and examples available at Extension Office. **CLASSES:**

- 440. AC Electric Projects. Electric projects with a 110 or 120 V alternating current (AC) power source, no 240 V exhibits are allowed.
- 441. **DC Electric Projects**. Electric projects with a battery.

or direct current power source. All DC electric projects must work with batteries supplied by 4-H'er.

442. Electronics Projects. Electronic projects with a battery or direct current power source. This class includes kits. Include instruction/assembly manual if from a kit, or plans if an original project.

443. Educational Displays and Exhibits. SMALL ENGINES

A. All exhibits should involve engines smaller than 20 horsepower.

B. No complete engines, lawn tractors, tillers, chainsaws are permitted for display.

C. Maximum tri-fold size for displays is a 3'x4'. CLASSES:

- 449. **Display** select one of the following options: 1) identify different engine or lawn and garden equipment parts or show the function of the engine or lawn and garden equipment parts; OR 2) identify and explain the function(s) of different special tools needed for small engine work; OR 3) illustrate and provide the results of any experiment in the NCS project books.
- 450. Maintenance Exhibit a display that illustrates either1) Routine maintenance procedures OR 2)Diagnosing and trouble shooting specific problems in an engine.
- 451. **Operation** Exhibit an operable small engine overhauled or rebuilt. Include maintenance schedule for the engine and a brief description of steps taken by the member overhauling or rebuilding the engine.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY

A. Displays limited to tri-fold boards 3'x4' and/or be free standing.

CLASSES:

452. Educational Display – Inform and Create awareness about power generated from a renewable energy source, ie. wind, sun, geothermal, tides or waves. 453. **Experiment** – Display an experiment addressing a problem or question related to power generated from a renewable source. Include hypothesis, background research, variables, a control, data, findings, conclusions and recommendations for future study.

WOODWORKING

A. THE PLAN FROM WHICH IT WAS CON-STRUCTED MUST BE WITH THE ARTICLE

EXHIBITED. The plan may be a photocopy, the actual pattern, or a scale drawing. It must be complete and accurate to the extent that a duplicate article could be built using the plan as a guide. Include a list of the cost of materials and amount of time spent constructing article.

B. Class 459 is not eligible for State Fair.

C. Articles made in shop classes in school and receiving a grade are eligible to exhibit.

D. Projects made from pre-cut kits are not allowed.

C. The poster display will depend entirely on the 4-H member's own imagination. The size of posters to be 22" x 28". Cardboard used should be suitable for hanging the poster, if necessary.

D. The letters must be written across the narrow width of cardboard. If not, the 4-H'ers will not receive a ribbon.

E. Only Home Environment, Forestry, Wildlife, and Shooting Sports posters are eligible for the state fair.

F. Fair promotional poster, must be displayed somewhere it can be seen publically before coming to fair. Please put place of display on back of poster.

BANNERS

A. Each banner should tie in with the theme of the fair, for 2016 it is "Fairadise!"

B. Dimensions are to be no more than 16 square feet with no minimum size.

C. Banners must be hung on a rod strong enough to support the banner. On each end of the banner rod, there should be a wire or chain six inches long. One end of the wire will be fastened to the end of the rod. The other end will be connected to an "S" hook which will permit the banner to be hung from a suspended wire in the exhibit building.

D. Banners are not allowed to use any copyrighted material or characters. ie: Sponge Bob, Care Bears, brand name products, etc.

E. Banners may include 3 dimensional items or be made of materials other than fabric as long as they may still be hung on a rod.

F. A label is to be attached to the front lower left-hand corner of the banner giving the name of the club, county, and year. Letters should be two inches in height. Names of 4-H'ers are optional.

G. All 4-H clubs should have banners at the Barber County Fair.

A. Types of exhibits in this division are open to educational or creative displays. Maximum exhibit size is 3'x4', unless it is an article made or repaired for the Home Environment Project.

B. EXHIBITORS MUST COMPLY WITH STATE

AND FEDERAL LAWS. It is illegal to possess threatened or endangered wildlife, or the feathers, nests, or eggs of non-game birds. Game birds and game animals taken legally during an open season may be used. The use of live wild animals in educational exhibits is prohibited. C.
